Focus of PPG spending

- Raising the achievement of pupils eligible for Pupil Premium who are below age-related expectations in reading, writing or maths in all year groups
- Provision of pastoral support for pupils eligible for Pupil Premium and their families in order to overcome practical, emotional or behavioural barriers which may impact on learning.
- Provision of financial support for educational visits
- Provision of financial support for extra-curricular activities
- Provision of financial support for attendance at before school club

Nature of support

- Small group support during and beyond the school day delivered by a teacher – reading, writing and maths
- Additional targeted support for maths and literacy in Key Stage 2 delivered by teacher
- Small group targeted interventions / support delivered by teacher
- Additional Teaching Assistant time in Key Stage 2
- Appointment of Family Link Worker
- Increased School Counsellor hours
- Appointment of Play Therapist
- Financial assistance for educational visits, including Year 5 and 6 residential trips
- Financial assistance for extra-curricular clubs, e.g. instrumental lessons

Impact of PPG spending

The school holds pupil progress reviews every half-term to assess pupils' attainment and their progress towards targets. We also evaluate the impact of interventions, including those aimed at raising confidence and self-esteem. We then plan interventions using our own evaluations and also take account of research on effective interventions for example the Education Endowment Foundation's Teaching and Learning Toolkit.



Some One to One and small group tuition took place out of school hours, thereby increasing pupils' learning opportunities.

Ofsted Inspection Report, November 2013:

Pupils funded through the pupil premium are given good support in the classroom, and in small groups outside their usual classrooms. As a result the gap in achievement with their peers is small and reducing.

At the end of the 2016/17 academic year:

Pupils in receipt of PPG achieved higher than non PPG pupils in Reading, Grammar, Maths and Science at the end of Key Stage 2.

Reading: 100% of pupils in receipt of PPG achieved the expected standard of which 50% were working at greater depth.

Writing: 100% of pupils in receipt of PPG achieved the expected standard or above.

Grammar: 100% of pupils achieved the expected standard of which 50% were working at greater depth.

Maths: 100% met the expected standard of which 50% were working at greater depth

Science: 100% reached the expected standard or above

(NB 100% = 6 pupils)

100% of pupils participated in the school residential visits.

Qualitative data confirms that pupils supported through counselling and therapy have shown an improvement in their emotional well-being which has had a positive impact on their learning.
